THE COMING SEASON

As the season approaches for opening the club house at Summerville and yachtsmen are beginning to stir themselves preparatory to an active summer on and near the water, the officials of the Rochester Yacht Club beg to call the attention of all members to the many features that have been planned for the good of the sport and the enjoyment of everyone affiliated with the club. It has been the aim of officials and committees of this organization each year to set a new standard for the succeeding season, to improve and strengthen the association and do everything possible consistent with resource, to establish a service in every department that would meet with general approval.

Last season, in the face of adverse circumstances a great deal was accomplished to bring about the desired result. In spite of discouraging factors that seemed well-nigh impossible of circumvention. many improvements were made and a service was established that was concededly the best in the history of the club. The experiment proved costly, but it reduced the complaints materially and an effort will be made again this season to set an even higher mark, the idea being to serve the best there is. under the assumption that our members will show their appreciation by an increased patronage that will warrant continued efforts to improve the general tone of the house.

By an unfortunate circumstance there will be no race for the Canada's Cup this year and in a special circular sent out to our members and yachtmen in general we have explained the controversy that resulted in the withdrawal of the challenge by the Canadians.

The incident, which happily was marked with

the best of good feeling, requires no further comment, and an overburdened public welcomes its passing.

But as much as we deplore the situation which makes a race for the Canada's Cup impossible, we turn with great enthusiasm to the big power boat race which will be conducted under our management in August for the "Rudder Cup." Our fellow member, Mr. Thomas Fleming Day, who last season greatly stimulated yacht racing on Lake Ontario by offering a handsome cup for a long distance race, has again come forward with another trophy, this time for a 300 mile motor boat race, which will be started and finished at our club house station. It will be the first contest of the kind ever held on Lake Ontario and will attract contestants from all over the Great Lakes and the Atlantic Seaboard, to say nothing of the many pleasure craft that will be on hand to witness the event. Particulars of this great race will be available later and we feel confident that as much interest will be manifested in this contest as has been shown on the occasion of our splendid regattas of

Work on the Basin anchorage has been progressing slowly for the very good reason that no arrangements have yet been made with a dredging firm to undertake the contract. It has been deemed advisable to wait until such a firm has other work to do in this vicinity, when the task of opening up and dredging our property can be done at a minimum of cost to us. Negotiations looking to this end have been entered into with out-of-town contractors and it is confidently expected that at a no distant date we will see a fine anchorage ground for our ever-growing fleet.

THE SAILING SCHEDULE

The yachting schedule this year will be along the lines followed out last season. As Decoration Day falls on Sunday, the usual opening cruise race will be held on Monday, May 31st, the yachts racing from Sodus Bay to Charlotte. This will give the salts opportunity to cruise down to Sodus Bay on Saturday and hold a rendezvous at that port over Sunday.

The Seamanship race which last year proved one of the biggest cards of the season, will be run off on the afternoon of July 5th. Judging from the favorable comment made on this event last season, every yacht under fifty feet capable of qualifying, will be in the hunt.

The 300 mile power boat race in August will be the first long distance race for motor driven craft ever held on Lake Ontario and no doubt will attract entries far and wide. The race is open to yacht clubs on salt or fresh water and will be started on Thursday, August 12th at 7 o'clock in the evening. It is figured that the racers will cover the course in less than forty-eight hours, which should bring the leaders in sometime during the afternoon of Saturday, August 14th. This will enable spectators to witness both the start and finish.

The closing race of the season will be a cruise from Oak Orchard to Charlotte on Labor Day. It is planned to have the fleet cruise to Oak Orchard on the preceding Saturday and on Sunday a long list of water sports will be run off. This was an amusing feature of the club's program last year, and more entries are looked for this season.

Taken all in all, the sailing members of the club should find plenty of diversion in the schedule. Power boat owners are especially urged to participate in all the club's cruises and help make the doings at foreign ports and at home entertaining and enjoyable.

The two ladies' days set apart for the benefit of the fair sex, should find every boat in the harbor at the disposal of guests. Figure out how many you can carry with perfect safety, let the Entertainment Committee know, and get into the spirit of the occasion for the good of the club, the furtherance of yachting and the delight of the fair sailors.

C A F E S E R V I C E

The cafe this season will be in charge of Mr. L. P. Heck, formerly of the Powers Hotel, who comes to us highly recommended as an efficient steward. and who knows the needs of this department of the club's service. One fact should be impressed on the minds of our members in connection with the cafe service, and that is, when contemplating giving a dinner party for four or five or more, try and arrange to give the steward advance notice so that he may know how many to count on, and about what the dinner is to consist of. For instance, if you are desirous of having a dinner served for your friends on the veranda, and wish certain dishes served that are somewhat out of the ordinary, a day's notice to the steward will enable him to procure the best and the freshest there is on the market and result in much better satisfaction to you and your party. Nearly all of our members realize that the patronage is very meager during the week, except on club nights and the week end, and consequently it is entirely out of the question to carry a big stock of seasonable foods — the loss would be too great. However, with the exercise of a little advance thought, the cafe can be made to produce the best there is and served in first-class style. Sometimes a few hours' notice would be sufficient; if you are going down in your auto, a telephone message to the steward before you start would facilitate matters greatly and tend to discourage complaints. On club nights, Saturdays and Sundays, it is expected that the service will be more satisfactory, but there will be less cause for dissatisfaction if our members will observe the custom outlined above.

A COUPON SYSTEM WILL BE IN VOGUE

To facilitate the financial problem of operating the cafe, a coupon system will be in vogue in this department during the coming season. These books will be issued in \$1.00, \$2.00 and \$5.00 lots and it is greatly desired that members make use of them. The idea is to do away with so much indiscriminate handling of cash by the help. The steward will be supplied with these books and they can be purchased of him at any time.

RACING RULES

Entries for the season shall be filed with the Secretary of the Regatta Committee at least 24 hours before the first race, accompanied by a certificate of measurement from the official measurer of the club.

All starts shall be "flying," and shall be one-gun starts.

Five minutes before the time of starting, a preparatory gun will be fired. A red flag will be hoisted if all buoys are to be left to port, and a blue flag if they are to be left to starboard. Should the gun miss fire, the lowering of the flag shall be the signal to start.

The preparatory gun for all races except those which take place on May 31, July 5th and Labor Day, will be fired at 2:20 p.m. The starting gun for the 30-foot class will be considered the preparatory gun for the 25-foot class, and the starting gun in the latter class will be considered as the preparatory gun in the 20-foot and 20-foot special class.

Starts in the various classes will be as follows:

In the event of an unfilled class, the gun will not be omitted.

The time limit on all club races, excepting cruises, shall be three hours over a six-mile course.

If a yacht in any class be the only contestant in her class, and sails fairly around the course, she will be deemed the winner, and, as such, entitled to the prize. This revokes the old rule, which necessitated the starting of two yachts to return a winner.

Every yacht must show a L. Y. R. A. racing number during the races.

RACING RULES


Skippers are requested to take their time from the clock in the west side Club House. This will be the time used by the official timekeeper.

The 16-Foot Class shall be unrestricted as to form, construction, size or ballast, except that the racing measurement under the "load water line and sail area" rule given in these pages shall not exceed 16 feet.

Every yacht must go fairly around the course and must not touch any mark, but shall not be disqualified if wrongfully forced to do so by another yacht.

Protest against a yacht for violation of these rules must be filed in writing with the Regatta Committee within twelve hours after the finish of the race.

Prizes in all Club races and all Club cruises will be awarded on the Thursday evening following the event in which prizes are won.





When one yacht is approaching another so as to involve a risk of fouling, one of them shall keep clear of the other as follows:

1. On different points of sailing.

A yacht free shall keep clear of one close hauled.

2. On the same point of sailing with the wind on opposite sides.

When both yachts are close hauled, or both free, or both have the wind aft and on opposite sides, the yacht with the wind on the port side shall keep clear.

3. On the same point of sailing with the wind on same side.

When both yachts are free, or have the wind aft and on the same side, the yacht to windward shall keep clear.

4. Wind aft.

A yacht with the wind aft is deemed to have the wind on the side opposite to that on which she is carrying her main boom. A yacht with the wind aft shall keep clear of a yacht on any other point of sailing.

5. Overtaking.

An overtaking yacht shall in every case, as long as an overlap exists, keep clear of the yacht which is being overtaken.

6. Definition of overlap.

An overlap is established when an overtaking yacht has no longer a free choice on which side she will pass, and continues to exist as long as the leeward yacht by luffing, or the weather yacht by bearing away, is in danger of fouling.

7. Altering course.

When of two yachts one is obliged to keep clear the other shall not alter her course so as to involve risk of fouling.

THE RIGHT OF WAY

8. Luffing.

A yacht may luff as she pleases in order to prevent another from passing her to windward, provided she begins to luff before an overlap is established.

9. Bearing away.

A yacht shall not bear away out of her course so as to hinder another in passing to leeward.

10. Rights on new courses.

A yacht shall not be entitled to her rights on a new course until she has filled away.

11. Converging close-hauled.

When two yachts, both close-hauled, on the same tack are converging by reason of the leeward yacht holding a better wind, and neither can claim the rights of a yacht being overtaken, then the yacht to the windward shall keep clear.

12. Passing and rounding marks.

If an overlap exists between two yachts when both of them, without tacking, are about to pass a mark on the required side, then the outside yacht must give the inside yacht room to pass clear of the mark. A yacht shall not, however, be justified in attempting to establish an overlap, and thus force a passage between another yacht and the mark, after the latter has altered her helm for the purpose of rounding.

13. Obstruction to sea room.

When a yacht is approaching a shore, shoal, rock, vessel, or other dangerous obstruction, and cannot go clear by altering her course without fouling another yacht, then the latter shall, on being hailed by the former, at once give room; and in case one yacht is forced to tack or bear away in order to give room, the other shall also tack or bear away, as the case may be, at as nearly the same time as is possible without danger of fouling; but should such obstruction be a designated mark of the course, a yacht shall not force another to tack under the provisions of this rule.




