

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE ROCHESTER YACHT CLUB

Our Club had its beginning in 1877*. In that year, thirteen gentlemen organized themselves as Directors of a society, the object being "the encouragement and promotion of Yachting."

A Clubhouse was erected, the first of four, on the beach in Summerville and was formally opened on June 23, 1877. Newspaper accounts reported that a Regatta, open to all Monroe County boats was held in July.

Historical record has a way of leaving gaps in recording, and so it was with R.Y.C.

In 1886, Incorporation papers were filed. In that year George H. Newell was Commodore, Matthew Cartwright, Vice Commodore; Charles A. Worts, Secretary; Edmund Occumpaugh, Treasurer and Edward N. Walbridge, Captain.

In 1887, land was cleared on the east bank of the Genesee River. This gave the Club an anchorage and was the beginning of our current basin. That year the roster showed 117 members, fifteen (15) Sail Yachts and eight (8) Steam Yachts.

It is not quite clear as to what happened to the first Clubhouse. Records indicate that it might have been destroyed by fire. So in 1889, the second Clubhouse was constructed on the west bank of the river.

The Club had grown to 157 members, twenty-nine Sailing Yachts and seven Steam or naptha launches. Such well known boats as "Madge", "Majel", "Velnelle", "Ripple" and "Nox" appeared on the roster.

In 1902, another move found the Clubhouse back in Summerville, just east of the east pier. It was a three story structure with a large veranda. This building later was to become known as, Popp's Inn and survived until the early 1950's.

In 1908 a plan was developed to improve the basin, the area was formerly a swamp. Some work was done in 1909, and lockers were added, however the dredging process is an on going thing.

In February 1912, the first issue of "The Compass" was printed with much fanfare and an Annual Budget of eight hundred dollars.

During 1917, a total of 77 new members were admitted to the Club against 7 resignations. About then, a Star Fleet was established with interclub racing with Cleveland Yacht Club.

In 1922 the fourth and current Clubhouse was built on the east bank, just north of the swing bridge. This Clubhouse was substantially remodeled in 1953, again in 1973. It has accommodated many a function in its sixty odd years.

At the annual meeting in 1923, the initiation fee was raised to \$30.00, the Dues \$24.00 per annum and the membership of the Club be limited to 500 people.

In 1925, the "R" Class came to the Club with a fleet of four boats, they were to become the backbone of the Clubs Racing activities, also in that year, the Club elected to membership, Sir Thomas Lipton, the famous Tea merchant and 5 time challenger for the America's Cup.

He presented R.Y.C. with a Trophy that bears his name. We still race for the Cup under L.Y.R.A. and still in "R" boats as the original Deed of Gift called for.

1926 saw the start of the Rochester Junior Yacht Club.

For 1933, dues were dropped back from \$50.00 to \$25.00 per year and the initiation fee was waived. Low water through this period required continual dredging and in 1935 it was reported that during the year, 15,000 yards were dredged at a cost of \$.50 per yard.

In the early 30's it was decided by some of our astute members that we needed a new design for our Dinghy Fleet. At that time we were sailing Cat rigged boats, while the Canadians and British were Sloop rigged. A delegation went to England and commissioned UFF-Fox to design a 14 foot Dinghy. This little craft proved so successful that in 1939 the International 14 Association was formed at R.Y.C. and we became Fleet Number One. In interclub competition, they raced for the Emerson and Douglas Trophies and at R.Y.C. they raced for the Baker and Ford Cups. The 14's went on to become World famous and to this day are still actively being raced.

For over fifty years, R.Y.C. was the dominating factor in Canada Cup contests. The Cup was won first by R.Y.C.'s "Genesee" in 1899, sailing under Chicago Yacht Clubs Burgee. It came to Rochester in 1903 having been won by "Irondequoit". It was successfully defended in 1905 by "Iroquois", in 1907 by "Seneca" and in 1930 it was "Thisbee", first of the 8 metre Yachts. In 1932 and 1934 it was "Conewago", she has the distinction of being the only boat to have won the Cup twice. It came to an end in 1954 when "Iskareen" lost to R.C.Y.C.'s "Venture".

1936 was a big year at R.Y.C. In June we sent eight men and three of our new 14 foot Dinghies to Europe. They first raced in Denmark, then Olso, Norway. Scotland was next, then on to Cowes, Isle of Wight, England. They returned home after two months with a basket of Trophies, including the Gold Cup, taken at Cowes. Another triump that year was bring the Worlds Star Class Championship to R.Y.C., our first Worlds. In L.Y.R.A. competition, we took the Mabbett and Lipton Cups. To top it off, we went to Chicago and brought home the Richardson Cup. In 1936, R.Y.C. came of age.

In 1939 the first of the Six Meter's arrived on the scene. Over the years they would develop into the greatest inter-club racing yet seen on the Lake.

Names such as Stork, Jill, Mist, Starwagon, Circe, Fun, Meteor and Goose became prominent in the basin. Fleets grew at Youngstown, Hamilton and Toronto. They raced in L.Y.R.A. for the Alarm, Castle and George Cups. At home they fought for the Todd, Colonel Pond, Hornbeck and Mcowen Trophies.

A 1941 news report stated "Now many of the best sixes are on Lake Ontario and it is well on the way to becoming the worlds Center of the Class".

In the mid fifties, we had the North Americans on the Lake with boats from as far away as California. The winner went to Norway at the invitation of the King and Queen. For those who experienced them, there will never be anything to replace the "Sixes" Golden Years. 1940 saw the membership at 260, the fleet numbered 115 boats, both Sail and Power. At this time, there were twenty-four employed on boats in the basin, with one having five.

1941 — Due to the War, Yachting at R.Y.C. leveled off and L.Y.R.A. cancelled all activities on the Lake.

In 1945 the Fleet included 106 boats:

2 - Comets	5 — Lightnings
4 – Six Meters	11 – Star Class
3 – Snipes	11 — Miscellaneous Sail
6 – Dinghies	24 – Power Boats
4 – "R" Boats	36 — Auxiliary Sail

It was in 1948 that R.Y.C. came into prominence. This was the Rochester Race, the longest fresh water race in the world. In the years of its running, it rated with the Port Hudson and Chicago Mackinac races and with these races formed a Summer Yacht Racing circuit.

In the early 50's we had high water as we did again in the early 70's.

It was about 1953 that the Dragon Fleet arrived, at its peak we had eleven boats. The inter-Club Trophy was the John Foster Dulles Cup. The Mayors, Klaus Baess, Darnell and Past Commodore's Trophies, were fought for at home. Yes, and after all these years, the Class is still very much alive.

Through the history of the Club, we have raced custom built boats, rule, built "P"s & "R"s, then the Meter boats "8"s and "6"s. The next classes to come were the One Design, Star, Dragon, International 14's, Jolly Boats, Rhodes Bantams, Knarrs, 420's, Tempest, Solings, Ensigns, 505's, Lasers and now Windsurfers.

During the late 60's and early 70's R.Y.C. carried out a most extensive physical expansion program. It involved all new lockers, sheet piling the entire basin, a new steel shed for winter storage, tennis courts, a swimming pool and a complete restoration of the Clubhouse. In 1982 we purchased the Yacht Center property adjoining the Club.

1977 was our Centennial year and we went all out. The Commodore assigned a task to each flag officer. The Vice Commodore was given the responsibility of putting the hundred years in print. It was a monumental task, however; the result would do any Club proud. We had a special Centennial Burgee R.C.Y.C. gave us a beautiful silver cup. That year we hosted L.Y.R.A. Also we had a formal ball that was well attended by the membership.

1979 – R.Y.C. has been a moving factor in many sailing events. We have hosted L.Y.R.A., Districts and National Regattas. Also, we have had World Championships, 1936 the Star Class, 1948 International 14's, 1956 Rhodes Bantams, 1973 Flying Dutchmans, 1975 Worlds Dragons. The year 1979, however, was to be outstanding. We hosted the "Women's Worlds". They raced in 420's and Lasers. This was the first Women's Worlds ever held in the United States.

In 1982 we were again to send an R.Y.C. boat to Europe, as we did in 1936. However, this time it was an 8 Meter. "Iroquois" went to Norway and came home a world champion and if that wasn't enough to prove a point, they repeated it in 1983.

Through the years R.Y.C.'s boats have raced off the lake to Chicago in 1899. Then through the years, S.O.R.C. saw the R.Y.C. Burgee in the 60's and 70's, six times in the Bermuda Race, five times in the Chicago Mackinac, and eight times in the Port Huron Mackinac. As for our cruising boats, we currently have two in the Mediterranean.

We can thank our founding fathers for the great history that R.Y.C. has had over the past 100 odd years and our object is still the same as theirs; "The encouragement and promotion of yachting."

THE RUDDER SHIELD



In 1909 Thomas Fleming Day editor of Rudder magazine and a member of R.Y.C. put up a trophy, known as the "Rudder Shield". The deed of gift stated that it was to be raced for by "Motor Driven Craft," and the course was not to be less than 300 miles in distance, thus making it the longest fresh water race in the world.

A course was laid out starting at Summerville, hence to Oak Orchard where a buoy was turned then across the lake to Presquile Island through the Murray Canal and down the Bay of Quinte. From the eastern end of the bay there was a short run that took the racers past Kingston and by some of the islands in the St. Lawrence to Clayton. Here another buoy was turned and then the long homeward stretch back to Summerville. Invitations were sent out to all Yacht Clubs on the Great Lakes and on July 18, 1909 at 7:30 P.M. there assembled a fleet of seven boats. "Klatowa", Queen City Yacht Club, "Helen" Ganaoque Yacht Club, "Maritta" from Buffalo Yacht Club and "Satanita", "Virginia", "Julugra", "San Souci", the last four from the Rochester Yacht Club.

It's apparent that with a turnout of only seven contestants that there was something amiss. It could possibly be explained by the absurd measurement rules of the American Power Boat Association. For instance the thirty-footer "Julugra", with a 25 horse power engine, was allowed one hour by "Santanita", a fifty-foot boat with fifty horse power. And to show how uniformly this handicap worked out "Santanita" beat "Julugra" by ten hours elapsed time.

It was a long all-night drill up the lake for all of the racers except "Satanita" which arrived at the finish line shortly before eleven o'clock, the "Helen" and "Klatawa" coming in only a minute apart at half past four in the morning, the "San Souci" half an hour later and the "Marietta" trailing them by another half hour. "Virginia" checked in shortly after eight o'clock Saturday morning and "Julugra" made a magnificent last about nine o'clock. Corrected times altered these positions very materially and the losers had a good laugh when the mathematics were posted.



The Lake Yacht Racing Association 1884 - 1984

The idea of a Yacht Racing Organization was first conceived aboard *ATLANTA*-BQYC during her return from Chicago after winning the Fisher Cup in the summer of 1883. It was formalized in Toronto on March 20, 1884, and is the oldest association of Yacht Clubs on the North American Continent.

Its constitution, first drafted that day by delegates of the four founding yacht clubs — Toronto, The Royal Canadian, Oswego, and The Bay of Quinte — defined its aim in these words: "The object of the association shall be to encourage yacht building and yacht racing and to establish and enforce rules for the government of all races in which yachts of two or more clubs compete."

Through the years regattas sponsored by LYRA took several forms. The first were of the "port-to-port" type. Boats would rendezvous at one port, race to another, where a oneor two-day regatta would be held, and then race to another port.

In later times "circuit" type regattas were sailed; that is, the fleet raced at one port and cruised to another port where they raced again. These port-to-port and circuit regattas were apparently quite grand affairs. The time taken varied from one to three weeks and the distance covered by individual boats was considerable, as for example in the regatta of 1892 when one yacht, *Oriole*, recorded 607 miles on her taffail log.


In 1908, a 190-mile race was held from Hamilton to Chaumont; this race is important inasmuch as it was the forerunner of the Freeman Cup Race which officially began in 1921.

Lt. Colonel Grant so well remarked in his fine history of LYRA that the greatest thrill of the year for a yachtsman occurs at daybreak, the morning following the start of the Freeman, as sail after sail shows up and all hands try to identify each new appearance and calculate how they stand on corrected time.

Today LYRA holds a regatta week consisting of the Freeman Race of approximately 120 nautical miles, three days of course racing, the Centennial race, and eliminations for the Richardson Cup and United States Yacht Racing Union Championships.

Rochester Yacht Club became a member in 1887 and Commodore George H. Newell became vice president and, in 1888, president. Through the years Rochester Yacht Club members have participated actively in the administration of the organization. Matthew Cartwright, T.B. Prichard, W.V. (Rooney) Castle, W.P. Barrows, Frank R. Shumway, Jr., William Stolze, and Helen Ingerson have all served as presidents. J.E. Burroughs, Charles VanVoorhis, W.V. (Jerry) Castle, Jr., Newton Castle have been vice presidents. George Culp was secretary for four years, Newton B. Castle for 16 years, Alan Goldstein for three years, W.J. Stolze for four years, Helen Ingerson for two years, and Henry W. Williams for two years, and Kelsey Scott served as treasurer for two years. Currently William J. Stolze holds the title of Honorary President and Frank C. Diem is LYRA historian.

Today there are twenty-three Member Clubs including two from Lake Erie, and thirty-three Associate Members.



The 1983 Lake Ontario Main Duck Island Race provided one of the wildest rides in recent memory for the 35 cruising class participants. Although the first boat to finish, Sideband, a Swan 44 owned by Bill Stolze of Rochester Yacht Club, averaged 7.22 knots over the entire 68 naut mile course, it was very much a classic fractional boat race. High winds resulted in excellent surfing conditions that the fractionals tolerate well, while the mastheads often found themselves overpowered and on their sides before the boats could be paid off.

The race, sailed from Fair Haven YC, N.Y. to Main Duck Island and back, began as a close port tack reach in 8 to 12 knot westerlies and carried across the lake in building winds and seas. By midnight the rain squalls brought rough 4-6 ft. short chop seas causing seasickness in almost every crew as the boats jumped and surged in the 15-22 knot winds.

Rounding the Duck Island buoy found the boats on a close starboard reach back the U.S. into gradually veering air that became a broad reach. By 5:00 AM, with 'chutes appearing all over the fleet, the wind had become northeast and began to blow in earnest with 20-25 kt gusts pushing the seas into sleigh-ride conditions. Blown spinakers and broken steering gear became a frequent occurance as the rolling seas made round-ups common.

On the return run, one of the smallest boats in the series, Hank Killion's J-24, Sea Monster, lost a foredeckman overside, turned back and retrieved him unharmed, turned again toward home and found themselves hot-rodding downhill at 15 kts to place 2nd in division! Hank later said that, despite the seas, in the morning light the man didn't think a harness was necessary — a decision he realized might have cost his life if it had occurred during the night.

Division I was won by Jack Whipple in High Voltage, a Pearson Flyer from Sodus Bay YC, who finished only 25 minutes behind the first boat to finish. Franz Schwenk of Rochester YC pushed his C&C 33, Umit Taka, to the winners circle in DIV II, and Tim Kinsella, also of Rochester, in Polestar, a Bristol 35, finishing first in DIV III. Division IV honors went to Andy Anderson of Fair Haven YC in Blue Iris.





1983 SCOTCH BONNET RACE Lake Ontario, New York

The 1983 Scotch Bonnet Race, held on June 17, an 81 nm triangle that crosses Lake Ontario twice, had the largest turnout in it's 12 year history. Seventy-nine boats in seven PHRF fleets ranging from 44 footers to 24 footers as well as a multi-hull division sailed the race.

Beginning Friday evening, the first leg was a close port tack reach in light air from the Rochester Harbor to Braddock Point Light, 8³/₄ nmiles to the west. Rounding the mark boat off the Light, the fleets, anticipating the predicted windshift to the west, continued to port tack reach to the northeast. As the wind continued to veer to the west, a typical Lake Ontario 180° windshift to the east suddenly occurred, wrapping chutes around headstays, stalling the boats, and creating chinese firedrills all over the fleet as the crews sorted out the resulting confusion.

The air remained light throughout the night and gradually moved to the south and again west as the fleets crossed the lake. Morning found the majority of the boats struggling in light westerlies to reach Scotch Bonnet Island, a rocky shoal approximately 3 miles off the Canadian shore, in fog that sometimes limited visibility to 50 yards.

The return leg was a slow 38 mile reach across the Lake in north-west wind that gradually diminished as the Rochester Harbor was approached. The race became an endurance contest as almost half of the fleet was still on the course after 24 hours of sailing.

Jack Cavalier's "Wildfire", a C&C 40 out of Rochester YC won first to finish and 1st in division honors. Former RYC Commodore Pete Woodmans in his Pearson 36, "White Pepper", took the next division, with Tom Shrader of Fair Haven YC sailing "Arcane", an Erikson 34m to victory in division C.

The PHRF II fleet had Mike Dwyer's "Hooligan", a Tartan 30 also from RYC in First place in the "A" division, Jim Hill's "Venture", a Pearson 30 again from RYC taking Division B silver, with still another RYC boat, Bob Fields' "Vitesse", a venerable Viking 28 taking division C.

Sailing an incredible race, Steve Corona, in "Azrael", a Freedom 25 from Genesee YC finished first not only in D division of PHRF II, but 1st overall as he nearly passed the 40 footers in the last mile of the race to be the 10th boat to cross the line. Steve said the light, relatively flat reaching conditions were almost perfect for the little 25 footer as it sailed nearly 90% of the race with its gunmount spinaker set.

1983 LYRA RACE WEEK Lake Ontario, New York

The Lake Yacht Racing Association (LYRA) race week began at Youngstown Yacht Club, NY with one of the largest fleets of recent years. 160 boats from Canada and the USA were divided into 14 divisions that included IOR, PHRF, C&C 29 fleets as well as the classic R-boat and 8 Meter fleets.

The week starts with the long distance Freeman race that is sailed over a different Lake Ontario course every year. This season the race covered a 137 naut. mile pattern that zig-zagged back and forth over the western end of the lake five times, prompting Jack Cavalier, owner of the C&C 40 "Wildfire", to comment that he was "beginning to see grooves worn in the water" from all the crossings.

The race was delayed an hour pending the arrival of an expected frontal system. After the start, the front, heralded by dry south west squalls, pushed the fleet to the Canadian shore on a port tack blast reach. The air moderated to 12kts for the 1st weather leg to the Welland buoy, 32 naut miles away. By nightfall the storm front was providing phenomenal pyrotechnic displays as most of the fleet drove toward the Port Credit crib mark. The storm finally broke at 3:30 a.m. with many of the boats under spinakers, and although few suffered crew injuries, many had blown sails in the knockdowns that occurred (world class J-24 skipper Guenther Buerman, at the helm of Tarry Polidors' champion 1/2 tonner "Wild Card" later said the 30 footer was pinned flat for 10 minutes by 65 kt winds). Morning found the boats on a smooth leg to the Youngstown buoy with the final leg to Toronto a tight, uneventful, port tack reach.


In IOR I, Gerhard Moog's custom 47 foot fractional, "Dynamo", out of Toronto, took the win, with fellow Canadian John Jefferson winning IOR II in the impressive "Valour", a custom Peterson 37. IOR III was taken by "Spirit", Norm Manson's C&C 38 from Niagara-on-the-Lake, with Tarry Polidor's "Wild Card" out of Rochester, NY, coming in first in IOR IV. The C&C 34 Division was taken by Harry Bunke in "Tiny Squeeze" from Niagara, and the Lake Ontario Rule (LOR) fleet won by Tor Johansson in a Viking 34, "Eagle". The PHRF divisions had fellow Rochester sailors Ed Fischer in "Cherokee" '82 PHRF Boat of the Year, and Fred Hubble/John Clapper in a C&C 33, "Desperado" taking the silver in divisions IV and III respectively. John Fowler of Sodus Bay YC sailed his Soverl 30, "Virginia Leigh" into the money in PHRF II while Dan Kolkmann, of Olcott YC winning PHRF I in his Redline 41, "Eagle". The C&C 29 fleet was won by the legendary Skip Doyle of Youngstown YC, whose childhood paralysis was of no handicap on the race as he pushed "Rockin Chair" into the winners' ring.

After a relaxing evening at the beautiful Island Yacht Club,

the following day had the fleet divided into two groups on separate race courses for the first of the three day races. All told the two groups were to sail two 18 nautical mile modified Gold Cup courses and one 28 mile three leg course with the Port Credit cribs as one of the marks. However, the days that followed had little of the expected onshore thermals and favored the smaller boats in each fleet in light air that causes all three races to be shortened.







In RYC racing Orion Schupp won the Fall Trophy Series, the Klaus Baess Trophy for best overall record, and placed third in the Summer Series.



Spring saw members of Ladies Racing assist with the yearly painting and rigging of the 420's and tech dinghies.



Boating activities are the central theme of the Jr. Yacht Club. During the summertime the members are involved with racing activites, water sports, and foosball at the Sailing Center.


Social activities are important during all seasons. The year is full of pizza parties, a dance or two, an excursion to Darien Lake (and, hopefully, Canada.)
