

Regatta, Cup Races Offer 22 Awards

Twenty-two different cups and trophies will be sailed for at the 1953 Lakes Yacht Racing Association regatta here July 29-31, and the Freeman Cup Race preceding it, it was announced last night by Jonathan H. Heinrich, regatta chairman.

Heinrich, a past commodore of the host Rochester Yacht Club, pointed out that this will be only the second time since founding of the association in 1919 that the regatta has been held here. Only previous time was in July, 1937. The first regatta in 1919 was sailed at Hamilton, Ont.

Thirty-three Canadian and American yacht clubs and fleets now are represented in the LYRA. Course racing in the various classes will start here Wednesday, July 29, following the sailing of the Freeman Cup Race

from Toronto to Rochester via Port Dalhousie, Ont. The latter starts Sunday, July 26.

Trophies include: The Freeman Cup and the Louise Freeman Trophy, awarded to the yachts making the best corrected time in the Freeman Cup Race in the cruising division and the racing division; the Fred Mabbett Cup given in 1929 to be competed for annually and going to the R or 20-rating class yacht making the best elapsed time in the long distance race; the Commodore Gooderham Cup, the Sir Thomas J. Lipton Permanent Trophy, the Fred Nichols Cup, the President's Cup, the Commodore World Cup, the Baldwin Cup, Founder's Trophy, Sampson Smith Star Trophy, Rochester Yacht Club Trophy for the yacht of the racing class making the second best corrected time; the Lake Ontario Trophy, for the large fast cruising yacht scoring most points in the course races; American Power Boat Association Gold Cup, the Montgomery Cup for U. S. One Designs, the Sodus Bay Cup, the Skaneateles Trophy in the Lightening Class, Douglas B. Jones Trophy, the Richter Trophy in the Hinckley Sou'wester Class, the Tom

Taylor Trophy in the Tumlaren Class, the Mott Trophy and the Yacht Racing Union Cup.

New Series of Races

Four Rochester Yacht Club 6-meter racing sloops were anchored at Youngstown Yacht Club in the Niagara River last night ready for inauguration of a new series of sailboat team races on Lake Ontario there Saturday.

The races, either two or three depending on the wind, will get under way at 10 a. m. over a 9-mile triangle off Old Fort Niagara at the mouth of the Niagara. There will be teams from the Royal Canadian Yacht Club, the host Youngstown YC, and Rochester. They will sail for the new Commodore Charles F. Colbert Jr. Trophy.

The four Rochester boats were towed part way and sailed the rest of the way to the Niagara River Saturday following the final

Area Drivers Back in Action

After a two-week absence, NASCAR Sportsman Division stock-car racing moves back into the limelight with a pair of area shows scheduled this weekend. Tomorrow night as usual, the speed merchants will assemble at Monroe County Fairgrounds. On Saturday they'll move down to the newly-lighted Hemlock Fairgrounds on Route 15-A, 25 miles south of Rochester.

The two-week respite caused by the annual appearance of the Grand National Circuit has given the sportsman drivers a much-needed opportunity to rebuild equipment that has taken a terrific beating in the first six weeks of the 1953 campaign.

Good turnouts are expected at both tracks this weekend to welcome back to area competition the cream of the stock-car crop from Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse and stops in between. Promoter Ed Otto expects 50 or more cars at Monroe County Fairgrounds, with Jerry Earl, the Hemlock track chief, making plans to accommodate between 40 and 50 drivers.

On Friday night, July 17, Otto will stage an innovation in area racing with an Amateur Night program in which drivers without

previous racing experience, men and women, are eligible. The cars must be strictly stock, and those interested in participating can contact NASCAR Chief Steward Mert Gundry at the Fairgrounds tomorrow night for details.
